

Updates: APS Substance Prevention



- White House Acknowledgement
- Expanded programming & partnerships:
 - Arise & Flourish
 - Silent No More
- Substance Abuse Counselors (8.0 FTE)
 - Small group supports
- Naloxone-in-Schools:
 - 442 students in grades 9 and above
 - 2017 APS staff trained, 1699 electing to carry themselves
 - Opioid emergency boxes installed in all secondary schools in collaboration with the Arlington Addiction Recovery Institute

Youth Mental Health

- DHS School-Based
 Behavioral Health Program
 - 4.0 clinicians in high schools
 - All clinicians hired and onboarded
 - Work collaboratively with school MH team
 - Considering targeted middle school support

DHS Crisis Intervention Center (CIC)

- Served 550 individuals since November 2022
- **45%** minors
- Dedicated Diversion First therapist for youth
- Diverts youth from emergency department
- Provides stabilization, evaluation, medication
- Connects youth/family to ongoing services and supports
- 50% are self- or family-referred
- 76% are able to return home







Substance Use Treatment

National Capital Treatment & Recovery

- DHS contract
- Adolescent outpatient program (OP)
- Adolescent intensive outpatient program (IOP)
- 20 admissions since June 2023

Opioid Abatement Authority Regional Partnership Grant

- \$22 million investment
- Arlington County match is \$180,000 annually (5 years)
- Medical withdrawal and substance use residential treatment for adolescents
- Status: RFP for service provision







All-Community Approach to Teen Mental Health & Substance Use

Prevention

- Informational media campaign
- ACEs community training
- Out of School Programming
 - Teen nights
 - Late night soccer and basketball
 - After-school drop-in programming

Education & Engagement

- Children and youth wellbeing plan development
- Funds website and digital strategies, elevate and amplify resources and language translation

Investments focus on teens and families experiencing urgent behavioral health issues and prevention. A total of \$1.9 million in combined one-time and ongoing money is allocated.

- 72 Adolescent and Adult Behavioral Health Beds
- Adolescent and Adult Intensive Outpatient Programs
- Adult Partial Hospitalization Program
- Adult Outpatient Behavioral Health Clinic
- NOTE: 14 Medically Compromised Beds & Comprehensive Psychiatric Emergency Program at VHC Health Main Campus

Recovery and Wellness (SU)

- 24 Adult Recovery & Wellness Beds
- Adolescent and Adult Recovery & Wellness Intensive Outpatient Programs





Coming Soon: Youth Crisis Stabilization

Regional Crisis Receiving Center

- In development
- Located in Woodbridge, PWC
- 16 Youth Short-Term Crisis Beds
- 16 Youth 23-Hour Crisis Recliners
- Managed by Connections Health Solutions
- Opening in 2025

Comprehensive treatment and care for youths and adults 24/7/365.



Walk-in mental health clinic

Two 24/7 walk-in mental health clinics – one for youth and one for adults – will be open to all individuals in need of mental health support, regardless of insurance or circumstance.



Crisis stabilization

A 23-hour observation unit providing rapid assessment, treatment, stabilization, and proactive discharge planning in a therapeutic environment.



Extended stabilization, treatment, and evaluation

Two 16-bed units will treat individuals requiring extended stabilization and treatment and evaluation services.





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
